me - I dont know why, but I somehow couldnt
begin a letter to you this time till I'd have
read yours - & this makes me very late you see -
but you are very good to make such excuses for
me & to trust me as about it - I do hope & try to
deserve it - & shall once more trespass on it for
understanding & excusing thy short letter this mail -
I have been at it keeping yet daily strong & betw
since I last wrote but happen to have caught cold
in my face a few days since & so am just now en-
joying the delights of a swollen painful face em-
bracing it set like I did at Cape Town - Its nothing
really only come provokingly just these last days
of writing for mail when I want all my strength
& senses doubly & by keeping me awake at nights
it is rather impairing to them - But I trust you
will forgive my extra stupid letter resulting from
it - I'm really much better so you may be sure
again all this - I only mention it to acct for
different things - I'm still in my native coun-
try you see - I left Boynton (the place from
whch I last wrote to you) on the 17th & came
here to stay with still older friends who have
been most kind to me too - & made my stay here as
nice & happy as they cd & see much I do enjoy
being with them & the quiet country life - many
things - But still the old pain of having to take
leave wd ever necessary to shock or pain them
to some degree spoils all - making me feel so
caged - oh I long to be back at Natal for that -
with all its faults & drawbacks one has
freedom there - Perhaps you will say its my
own fault for that he who will may be free

any where - But to do that one must not be
a moral coward like I am - as I long for the
place where even a coward can be free - & I cd
at Natal - I believe I leave this on the 28th for a
mother friend of olden times who lives at Workburg
(our old parish & home) spend a few days with
her - then a few more at the Bentley (where I was
staying when I began y^r last letter to you) then a
week at or near Stone with the Normans
(Mr Floyds mother & sister you know) & on the
19th leave Staffordshire for a ten days visit
to Mr & Mrs Puckette (she is the elder sister of
poor George Wolly who I spoke of in a former letter
as having been once engaged & dear soul & dying
last October at Natal to our great sorrow) at
Bromyard, Worcester shire - They were staying
at old Mr Wollys & at Malloch at the same
time I was - last July - I liked them both much
as am looky forward to this with great pleasure
& old Mr Wolly (whose liberal ideas I men-
tioned last letter) speaks of coming there too to see
me - wd you can understand my looky forward
two since our correspondence - Hence I go to
London for a few days with Mrs Fisher - so
shall hope to write from there next mail -
an interruption here - & a most pleasant one
for it brought your letter of the 7th just in time
to acknowledge - I'm so glad - Thank you
much for it - The 2 papers also whch I recd
with yr fine letter on the 1st - I shall much
enjoy them when the mail has gone - I'd
think of a chance of seeing you in England - that
is too good - only I fear we should have no nice
pleasant time - please for seeing each other like
I shd wish - I think you too - if not too busy
with yr many other friends & business too
however all that is in the abryss of the future at
present - I can well understand the anxiety for
Natal after that rumour - but it seems
to have been quite false - if so its dreadful

for people ought not to be thus troubled
& fretted for nothing - I've not seen that re-
view a book but will try & read both - then
you must for tell me of them - I do so like
to know of mine real ones -

You forgot to enclose that card after all -
I shd like to have seen it - I'm very glad your
Aunt is so happy - Yes it does seem a very
funny idea to me - I mean people's publicly
announcing these things - I think all the talk
& remarks et cetera that are made ^{every} ~~about~~
~~them~~ so hateful - But perhaps the very busi-
ness like publicity in Germany makes it less
noticed or in this unpleasant way I mean -
I think I may safely promise to tell you what you
speak of should it ever happen - as I believe
nothing to be more improbable than that I shd
have to fulfil the promise no dear Dr Black
I don't mind your saying it - but thank you
very much for your kind interest for me -
I think like you all it - about the reality I mean
not of mentioning it - for I didn't make a face at
all, or either say or think the kind speech you
give me credit for - It's quite true English
ideas & prejudices on these subjects must be
rather different to German ones - as to our
side things I mean - but the great heart
of humanity wh underlies all distinctions
of name & race - makes the real feeling the
same in all I think - & it's this in what you say
that makes me quite understand & accept it
as if my real brother had said it - I think you
know I have no brother really - I often think
about it now & wonder how it must feel
to have one - But really I shd hold you for talking
in that way & trying to turn all your kind words
into ridicule afterwards as - well I must con-
